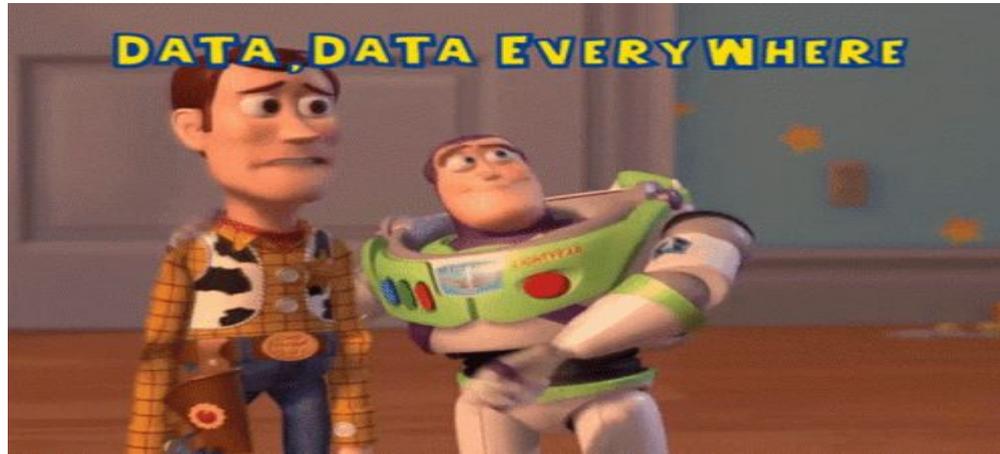

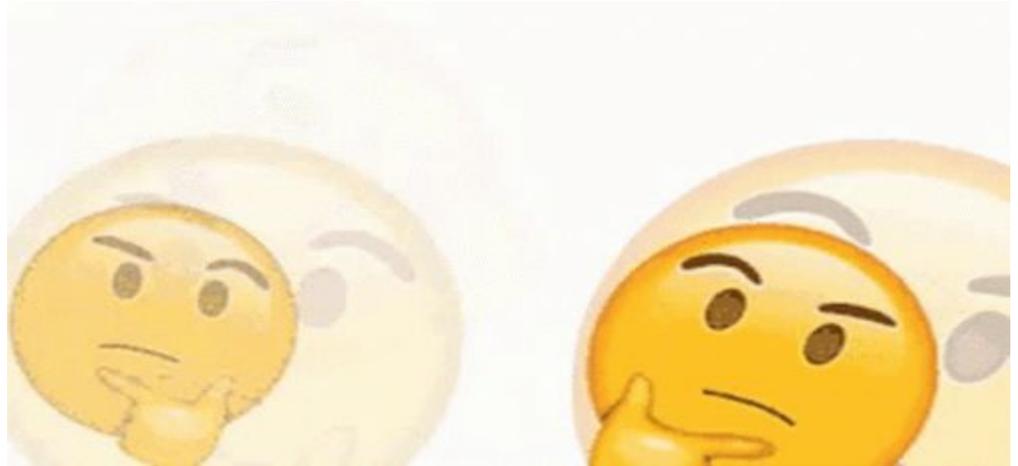

# Potential Misuse of Paraprofessionals

1. Conceptually Questionable
2. Unnecessarily Restrictive
3. Associated with Inadvertent Detrimental Effects
4. Insufficient Approaches for Decision-Making

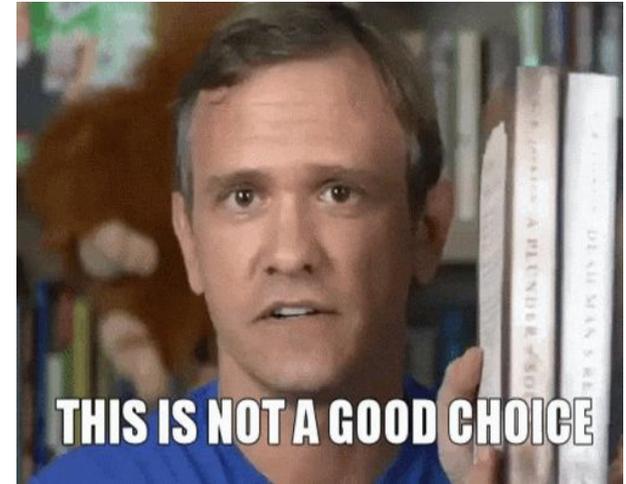




# Conceptually Questionable

Why would we ask non-certified staff to support our most complex students?

Potentially misaligned with IDEA and ESSA's requirements to provide access to highly qualified staff.

# Unnecessarily Restrictive

Could actually impede access to FAPE

Inconsistent with goals geared toward independence

Especially true if there is no plan to fade out the support

# Inadvertent Detrimental Effects

Isolation within the classroom (example: seated with a convenience  
for the para's access)

Insular relationships between student/para

Unnecessary dependence

Interference with peer interactions

# Inadvertent Detrimental Effects (continued)

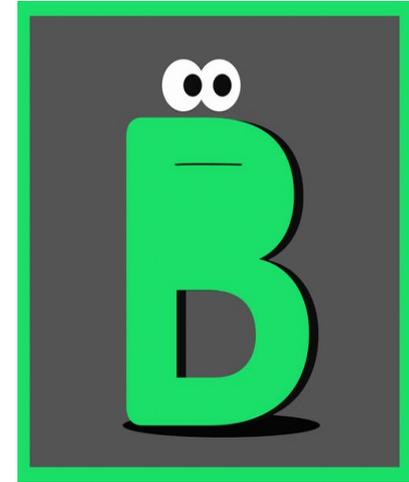
Stigmatization

Provocation of behavior problems

# Insufficient Decision-Making Approaches

Do you currently have a data-driven process?

Lack of a process can lead to inappropriately providing supports.

Could lead to negative outcomes OR inadequate supports  
for the student.

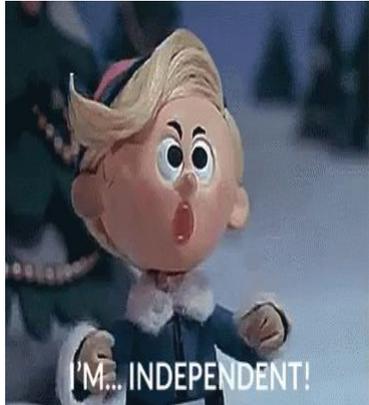


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# Students with Severe Disabilities

Many students may always be dependent on assistance from others, but there is a continuum from less to more extensive support.



For many, the biggest goals are self-advocacy and some level of independence.



## Negative Implications of One-to-One Support

Constant presence and close proximity decrease student autonomy.

Can lead to a lack of psychological empowerment.

Fewer opportunities to practice self-advocacy.

Diminish social role valorization.



## Let's Get Nerdy...



“A meta-analysis review of paraprofessional implemented interventions for students with autism spectrum disorder” (2020)

Interventions delivered by paraprofessionals are more effective in inclusive settings within the context of whole group arrangements.

**Interventions delivered by paraprofessionals are least effective within self-contained and one-to-one instructional arrangements.**

# Why should you know all this?



Support parents so they understand that there really can be “Too much of a good thing”

Help the IEP team weigh the positives and negatives and consider how para support may impact goal attainment (especially in the areas of independence and self-advocacy)

Explain to the team why alternatives are considered before heading down this path



# Why should you know all this?

Overly relying on paras delays attention to important changes!

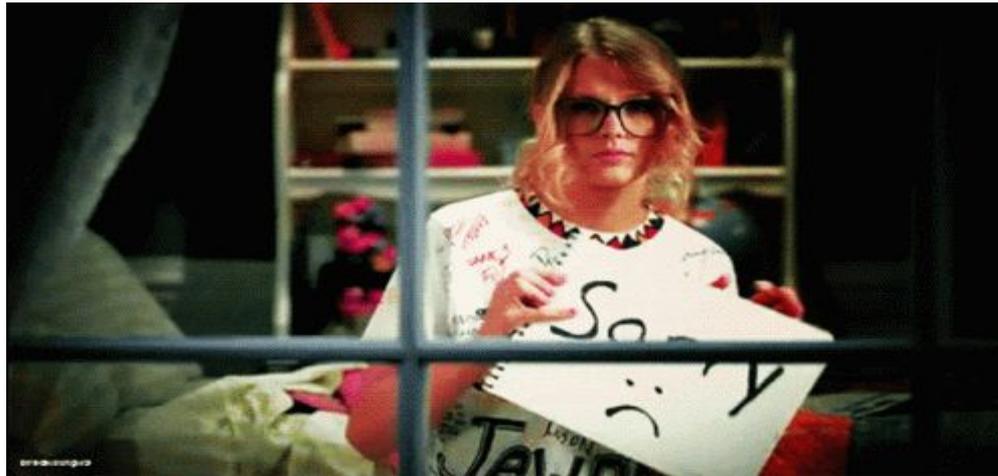
- Parent concerns
- Teacher concerns
- Admin solutions

What qualifies a student for a 1:1 para is not defined in the IDEA

## Step 1:



- \*Listen to the parent/teacher and take note of their “why” they think their child needs more paraprofessional support
- \*Look at the child’s IEP present level and goals over time
- \*Does what the parent think a paraprofessional will do match up with what a paraprofessional actually does?

## CONSIDERATIONS FOR 1:1 SUPPORT IN SCHOOL



### PURPOSE

1:1 support refers to the staff-to-student ratio. A student receiving 1:1 support has an adult assigned to support them for some or all of the school day. This document is intended to support Individualized Education Program (IEP) and 504 teams as they consider 1:1 support for a student. There are many important considerations related to the decision to provide and plan for 1:1 support. This level of support could help or hinder student progress. If the IEP or 504 team has decided 1:1 support is appropriate, the Local Education Agency (LEA) must provide the support.

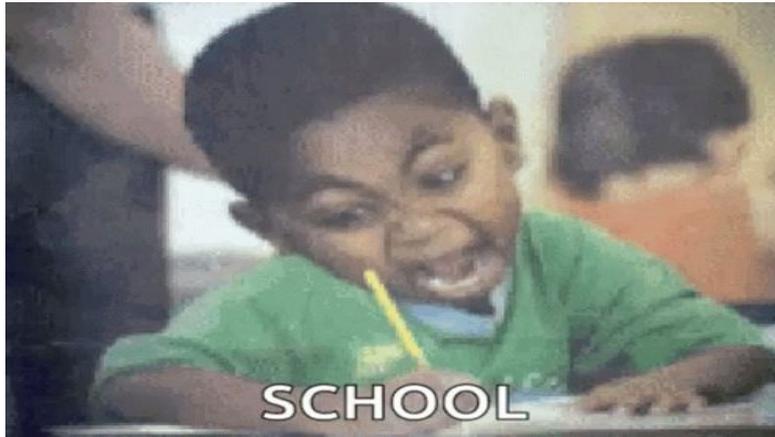

# Intensive Needs Checklist

## What is it?

Develops an overview of what needs the student is currently presenting in relation to the learning environment.



## Why do we need it?

Always look for educational benefit.

Decision making should be data driven.

Focuses the conversation!

# Student Needs Rubric

## What is it?

Systemic analysis of the student's needs, strengths, and areas for support throughout the child's school day.

## Why do we need it?

Creates a baseline if one does not exist.

Refines the settings where additional support may be needed.

# What do we do next?



## **Option One:**

If interventions and/or modifications can be made to the student's current program/environment, stop the process.

Identify support modifications and present to the IEP team.

## **Option Two:**

If no interventions and/or modifications were identified, continue to Step 4.

# Student Abilities Observation Matrix

## What is it?

An observation and documentation form of what the student really is or is not capable of doing

## Why do we need it?

These are the precise details of a student's current capacity

Helps team hone in more specifically on perceived student abilities

# What do we do next?

## Option One:

If support modifications are needed and additional paraprofessional support is **not** recommended, review the Student's Needs Rubric, Checklist of Existing Environmental Supports, and Student Abilities Observation Matrix.

Identify support modifications and present to the IEP team

## Option Two:

IF no interventions and/or modifications were identified, continue to Step 5



## Step 5

If additional paraprofessional support **is recommended** consider if the need can be met with existing staff through a staffing change or if additional staffing is required. Complete a Plan for Paraprofessional Assistance to determine the quantity of support that will be anticipated for the student.



# Student Support Worksheet for Daily Planning

## What is it?

An establishment of the *time* needed to specifically support the student.

## Why do we need it?

Informs the team of *exactly* when the student needs supports.

Ensures the fading of support isn't an afterthought.

# “Ending” the Process

Hold the IEP meeting with the newly identified additional times for support:

- Explain how you came to these numbers

- Create a schedule for your paraprofessionals with the existing staff you have and your new data



# “Ending” the Process

Make sure the para is being used appropriately

- Supplemental, not primary

- Planned by a qualified professional

- Based on explicit and intensive training

- Followed by ongoing supervision to ensure implementation fidelity -  
especially regarding fading of support!

These same tools can be used to identify **overreliance** on paraprofessionals





# 1:1 Paras

## Other Solutions

### Before considering a 1:1:

- Assistive Technology
- Teacher Training
- Use of Existing Supports
- Assign to a class, not a student
- PBS
- Peer Supports



# 1:1 Paras

## Other Solutions

### Peer Supports

- Shift the para from direct support to facilitator

- Coach peers to provide natural supports

- \_Fosters conditions for peer relationships to grow and flourish
